How the pupil premium allocation will be spent in the academic year Sept 2021 to July 2022:

- Family Support Worker, employed to identify pupils through a tailored programme of individual or group mentoring sessions to improve well-being, confidence and self-esteem to remove barriers to learning and therefore improve achievement and access to the curriculum
- Family support worker will also continue to support families with attendance and other barriers to learning. Child Protection and CIN case work will be undertaken, meetings with social workers and other outside agencies, mental health support and signposting, parent education groups, newsletters and open mornings
- Increased staff to pupil ratio in classrooms to support inclusive practice and secure progress
- Intervention programmes, in addition to quality first teaching, for identified pupils who are not meeting age related expectations or making expected progress relative to their starting points, and for those with identified Special Educational Needs or Disabilities (SEND)
- Access to specialist assessments linked to neurodiversity for those pupils with identified Special Educational Needs or Disabilities (SEND)
- Continue to employ an external councillor to support pupils and staff with mental health and well-being issues
- A comprehensive programme of training and development for all staff linked to school development priorities
- A wide range of IT resources to support remote and blended learning including Learning by Questions, Accelerated Reader, Spelling and Maths Shed
- A range of after school activities at a greatly reduced cost to identified pupils (in line with risk assessments)
- Subsidising educational visits and residentials linked to the curriculum (in line with risk assessments)
- Support to purchase school uniforms for all eligible pupils

Instrumental lessons in school for eligible pupils

Targeted academic support for current academic year

Priority 1	To improve the attainment and progress of disadvantaged children through 'catch-up teaching' delivered throughout the week. To ensure that the impact of Covid-19 and lockdown has as little impact as possible for PP children
Priority 2	Provision of counselling, positive mental health sessions and behaviour therapy, to address any behaviour issues. This will ensure that children are 'more settled' in order to facilitate a learning environment conducive to learning. The family support worker, alongside outside agencies, will deliver positive mental health sessions, pastoral support and one-to-one work as and when required for individual pupils
Priority 3	Parents engage fully with the school in all areas, particularly in light of the restrictions and new procedures put in place due to Covid19. Outcomes are not adversely affected by extended periods of absence, for example, where children have had to self-isolate. A system for home learning has been put in place to ensure education can continue for children not attending school.
